From the Pastor...

It was our first Christmas together as husband and wife. Karina and I were beginning to establish traditions, sometimes without even knowing it. We decorated the tree - this year it was mostly decorations that she has collected over the years - the one's I had are still packed up at what we lovingly call "the summer house". But there were a couple ornaments that had special significance for us. One was a present - an "Our First Christmas" ornament - and we even set up the camera on 'timer' and caught the moment of hanging of the ornament together! After the summer house is sold and we are able to combine even the Christmas decorations of two households, I'm sure even more decorating rituals will be forthcoming.

Yet our tradition-establishment didn't stop there. We had invited family and friends to share Christmas dinner with us. By preparing both prime rib and salmon we may have initiated another tradition for the meal itself. But there was a much more significant tradition that I feel will go on forever. Before we left the table, we tried an idea that had been offered at the "Passing On Faith" conference in September.

Marilyn Sharpe had offered her establishing a "tradition" using a Blessing Bowl and Mat. The bowl contains ceramic "stones" representing significant moments that make up people's lives. There are stones for "Mountain highs" and "Valley lows". There are stones representing "Gratitude" and "Care". Stones to represent "Beginnings" and "Completions".



As we went around the table, each person chose a stone – either randomly or by choice, and shared a story – something significant that was brought to mind by the topic so chosen. We heard about losses, both the sorrow of losing a friend or relative; and the loss of current employment. We heard about mountain highs in celebration days, as well as conclusions and new beginnings, as relationships were affirmed and re-affirmed. With humor and tears, some thirteen people had stories to tell, and it proved to be a most heart-warming and memorable occasion.

What a joy it was to celebrate, not only the time and meal together, but to hear the stories - stories that make our relationships so solid and unforgettable.

I think I can safely say this Christmas provided some wonderful opportunities for Karina and me to share our love, joy, hope, and peace ... and along the way it granted us time to establish rituals and traditions.

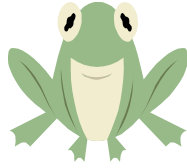

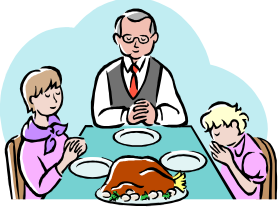

“Come Lord Jesus be our guest...”



Before every family meal as a child one of us would say “Come Lord Jesus be our guest and let these gifts to us be blessed”, followed by a collective “Amen”. Now, one of our two children, or both, say this same blessing. My wife, Malissa introduced a new twist to dinner over the past few years. Malissa began to ask at mealtime what we were thankful for during the day. This brought Thanksgiving to the table more than once a year.

After a caring conversation with Phyllis, I introduced a lighted candle to the dinner table. I explained to Sarah and Sydney the lighted candle reminds us of the presence of the Holy Spirit. At first, they did not seem too impressed with the introduction of the candle but I knew to give it a couple of weeks for them to adapt to this sudden change in their routine. Before too long, they began to remind us every night to light the candle.

It is easy to see that we started these simple traditions intentionally, although I will admit that only recently I began to really reflect on their vital role in the practice and sharing of faith with one another. Sometimes traditions are born without intent. While my family enjoyed the snow, it resulted in missing a ritual and tradition we look forward to every year. We were unable to attend Christmas Eve service due to the weather this year. We missed sharing this special service with extended family and the restaurant prepared dinner to preserve the orderly house ready for Christmas day that usually follows.

We knew the sadness of staying home Christmas Eve would pass. As the arctic air dwindled into the night the girls asked me to read Charles Dickens’ A Christmas Carol. As we read conversation would interrupt the script with questions about spirits, Scrooge’s behavior, the poor, money and how Scrooge changed. Nothing unusual about discussing how Scrooge forged his chains in life but what was truly astonishing is how our children took the words from this book and connected it with the life of Jesus Christ from his birth to his resurrection. It was a reflection on how we are to lead our life, to be good stewards of the earth and humankind, how we are saved from the burdens of life and forgiven for our sins. A missed tradition turned into a caring conversation and perhaps a new yearly tradition of reading a simple story and reflecting on how it applies to our faith.

As the New Year approaches my family will begin a new Sunday tradition going out to eat after the service to discuss and reflect on the Sunday School lesson, the Children’s Message and the Sermon. Is there a new ritual or tradition you would like to introduce in the coming year? Let the New Year serve as a reminder to not only continue rituals and traditions but an opportunity to establish new ones to help pass on your faith.

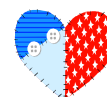

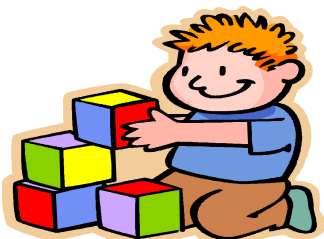

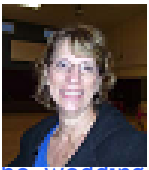
Carol Leonetti

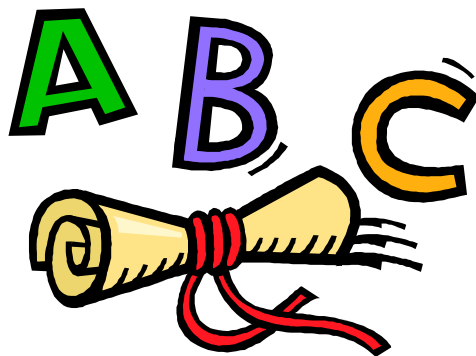
Vicki Bjorklund

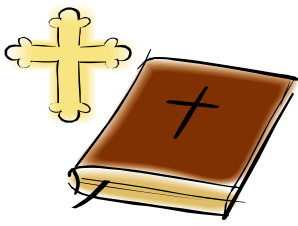
